PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Hello NDSS Community, it is hard to believe that November has arrived so quickly! With the coming of November, we are nearing the end of our first term, the halfway point of the first semester. Term End is upon us next week, November 8th and the new term begins on November 9th. Please ensure that your son or daughter is aware of their standing in each of their courses, and is aware of any outstanding assignments. We will be having report cards issued on Wednesday, November 23rd and parent/teacher conferences on Thursday, November 24th from 2:00 - 5:00pm.

The province of British Columbia has revised the reporting procedures for Grades K-9, and is in the process of revising procedures for Grades 10-12. NDSS hosted our first parent open house last Tuesday, October 25th to discuss these changes, and to bring in feedback from our parents for how reporting will look at NDSS. We had eighteen parents show up and their feedback has been collated. We will also send out the discussion points electronically to all of our parents, to gather further feedback from those who could not come to the open house. Please expect that email this week. New reporting techniques will be utilized in second semester for Grade 8 and 9 Students. As these plans are firmed up, we will pass along the details to our school community.

Not only is reporting across the province changing, but we are in the midst of curricular change as well. The Grade 8-12 curriculum has undergone revisions at the provincial level and the NDSS staff is working to incorporate these changes at the school level. This is a monumental process and our learning leaders are working with their departments to bring this change forward. Students will be seeing these changes in the course selection booklets this year, with new course offerings to be available for September 2017.

Mr. Marusic has been working with our staff, students and community to create our annual Remembrance Day Assembly for Thursday, November 10th. All students will be invited to the large gymnasium for this assembly, where we will be collecting donations for the Legion. It would be great if everyone could ensure that their son or daughter has a donation for the poppy that they will receive at that time. Our students at NDSS are always very respectful at these assemblies and it is an essential tradition to remember the sacrifice of the men and women who have perished in war.

YOUTH SERVICES—ISLAND HEALTH

The NDSS Youth Services will be Thursday afternoons from 12-3:30 twice a month. Island Health will provide both a public health nurse and a family doctor on the following dates: Oct 6th & 20th, November 10th & 24th and December 8th &15th.

The centre will offer health services by either drop-in or appointments and is open to all students of NDSS School. The centre is located next to the counselling office. Services include low cost birth control and emergency contraception; free pregnancy testing; STI testing and screening; immunizations; and referrals to child youth mental health and addiction services. Physicians will see students for any health/wellness related matters including referrals for x-ray, blood work and mental health support.

Essentially the students can see a doctor for any reason just as they would in the community at a walk-in clinic. The Youth centre is intended to allow low barrier services and convenient access for our youth population. Students are welcome to come in with any health related questions or concerns and will be treated with respect and be given outstanding care by our staff. All services are confidential. The centre is closed during regular school breaks such as Winter break and Spring break and professional development days.

Re: Nanaimo Ice Centre and NDSS Student Access

Dear NDSS Community,

NDSS has three key neighbours, the Nanaimo Aquatic Centre (NAC), The Nanaimo Ice Centre (NIC) and Vancouver Island University (VIU). Our students are currently accessing these facilities before, during and after school hours. This letter is intended to clarify when our students should be accessing our closest neighbours: The NIC and the NAC.

Though the majority of our students are respectful representatives of our school, concerns over the misbehaviour of some students have made the following parameters at the Nanaimo Aquatic Centre and Nanaimo Ice Centre necessary.

NDSS Students are bound to the NDSS School Code of Conduct, as well as to the Code of Conducts for both the NIC and the NAC. Students represent our school while at these facilities and our expectation is for them to act in a manner that NDSS can be proud of.

Nanaimo Ice Centre (NIC)

*The Nanaimo Ice Centre is a community recreation facility that is not configured to supervise our students.

NDSS Students With Access: The NIC is to be accessed only by students that are participating in the NDSS Hockey Academy, Silvertips, or a supervised Physical Education Class.

NDSS Students <u>Without Access</u> - Students in Grade 8 – 12 should <u>not</u> be at the Ice Centre during school time. This is a community recreation centre and is not staffed to supervise students from NDSS.

Nanaimo Aquatic Centre (NAC)

*The Nanaimo Aquatic Centre is a community recreation facility that is not configured to supervise our students.

NDSS Students With Access:

- ⇒ Before School Students may access the NAC before school hours.
- ⇒ During Class time Only Grade 12 students with a study block should be at the NAC during class time.
- ⇒ Lunchtime Students may access the NAC during lunch hours.
- ⇒ After School Students may access the NAC after school hours.

NDSS Students <u>Without</u> Access – Students that are in Grade 8, 9, 10, and 11 should not be in the aquatic centre during class time, or between their morning or afternoon classes. Students in Grade 8-11 should only be at the NAC before school, at lunch, and after hours.

Don't miss the 2017-2018 House of Commons Page Program Application Deadline – Monday, December 5, 2016

The Page Program provides young Canadians with the best seats in the country to listen to heated parliamentary debates of our nation, learn about Canadian politics first hand, as well as share this year-long phenomenal experience with fellow young Canadians from coast to coast. It is a once in a lifetime opportunity that will mark one of the most memorable years of your life. (Cissie Liu, former House of Commons Page)

A camera captures the Speaker of the House of Commons as he calls the House to order. A Member rises to ask a question, *Hansard* in hand. The Clerk of the House makes notes on the daily scroll. A House of Commons Page delivers an urgent message to the Prime Minister. These are the sounds, sights and pace of a day in the House of Commons. In the Chamber and around Parliament Hill, Pages live and breathe the history and action of one of Canada's oldest political institutions.

House of Commons Pages are selected from high schools and CEGEPs across Canada every year. These students work in the House of Commons while beginning their studies at a university in the National Capital Region and make friendships and memories that will last a lifetime.

Pages play a key role in the communications network on Parliament Hill. Delivering important messages and documents to Members, linking Members to their Hill offices and serving House officials in various capacities, House of Commons Pages are always on the go. Professional, non-partisan, prompt and efficient service has become a hallmark of the House of Commons Page Program.

The 2017-2018 Pages will be contracted to work at the House of Commons for one year, beginning in late-August 2017. They will work a minimum of 15 hours a week and their work schedule will be coordinated with their university schedule.

A salary of \$15,455 will be paid in 26 equal payments to Pages throughout their working year. In addition, a sum of \$1,200 will be paid at the successful completion of the contract in August 2018.

Each candidate must:

- be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident;
- be graduating from a secondary school or a CEGEP (with no academic interruptions) and begin full-time university studies in September 2017;
- have an overall academic average of at least 80%;
- be able to communicate efficiently in both official languages, as evaluated by the House of Commons; and
- apply to a university in the National Capital Region, be accepted and accept the offer of admission.
