





















NLPS ACADEMY REGISTRATION INFORMATION:


School Registration 2019-2020

To register your child in Nanaimo-Ladysmith Public Schools, the online, centralized registration will begin on January 9, 2019 at 8 a.m. Pacific Standard Time. The following information will help determine if this process will apply to you.

Take a moment and ask yourself the following questions:

- 1. Is my child new to Nanaimo-Ladysmith Public Schools?
- 2. Do I have a child that will be turning five years old on or before December 31, 2019 that will be entering Kindergarten? Applications must be received by June 15, 2019 to ensure a placement in your child's catchment-area school.

 3. Do I want to register my child in Late French Immersion?
- 4. Do I want to register my child in Early French Immersion? Applications will be received until January 31, 2019, at which time student selection will be determined by lottery. Parents will be notified in early February 2019. Late French Immersion Students are placed as space permits.
- 5. Do I want to register my child in secondary academies?



Applications will be received until March 1, 2019, at which time student selection be determined either by lottery or tryout/audition. Parents will be notified in May

Do I want to apply for a school transfer request (out-of-catchment)? Applications are due March 31, 2019.

This Cashier Training course provides participants with basic training on cash register functions so that they feel comfortable and confident when entering the retail industry. On completion, participants are prepared to enter the work force with the knowledge and skills of what a cashier position entails.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS:

- REGISTER OPERATIONS keying prices; use of codes; managing special functions e.g.; voids, discounts, coupons, tax exemptions, refunds and sale pricing, counterfeit awareness, interpreting and changing register tapes
- SALES TRANSACTIONS collecting cash payments and tendering change; processing credit card and debit payments, receiving coupons and gift certificates, handling returns
- RECORD-KEEPING preparing float records, tallying and reconciling sales for shift reports, filling out deposit forms, completing other work documents for cashier/sales duties
- > SALES/SERVICE INTERACTIONS using customer service skills for effective communication: e.g. greeting customers, answering inquiries, offering information, and handling complaints
- OTHER SKILLS enhancing math and language skills to work with currency; estimate and check machine calculations, perform record-keeping, manage communication

The NDSS rugby team is leaving on tour! We are going to San Francisco from March 17-24, where we will play against three local high schools and experience the sites of this iconic town.



OUR BLANKET WEAVING

Our grade 8/9 hul'q'umi'num' class has woven a traditional blanket, as well as sharing all the teachings that go along with this traditional art form. This was our first blanket that we have done, so the teaching is that when you do something for the first time it is to be given away. We are giving it to NDSS. The wool had to be washed several times, carded and spun, before it was ready for weaving. We used sheep wool for our weaving, but there are many other types of wool that Coast Salish People use for their weavings, such as mountain goat wool, and wooly dogs wool. The pattern that our class did is called the "Herring Bone" pattern. Coast Salish people use their weavings as status symbols or currency, and also for practical uses. People used to stand on the roof of the big house and throw the blankets into the community members gathered for

potlatches, where the women would catch them and then take the blankets apart and create blankets of their own design. Tradition is very important to this culture, and the skill of weaving as well as the teachings that go along with it, is handed down from generation to generation. Weaving gives the Aboriginal people a sense of identity.



TRANSCRIPTS: HAVE YOU CREATED YOUR STS ACCOUNT?

June 2019 will be the first year that the Ministry of Education does not mail graduates an original transcript for their records upon graduation. Instead, they are encouraging students to create an account and access the Student Transcript Service.

Transcripts will be available for students to print or send on the StudentTranscripts Service. Students are encouraged to create an STS account prior to the release of assessment or exam results.

- Send your secondary school transcripts to postsecondary institutions
- Order your graduation certificate
- View your scholarships
- View your provincial exam or graduation assessment results.
