PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear NDSS Community,

As many of you may have heard, my tenure as NDSS Principal is sadly ending at the end of this semester. This is my eighth year as an administrator at NDSS and it has been my pleasure to serve this terrific community. Prior to NDSS I had a terrific journey as a teacher in a few districts, but most notably in Nanaimo at Woodlands, McGirr, Wellington, Gabriola, and Barsby. I consider myself tremendously lucky to have moved into administration at NDSS, a school I had spent relatively little time in since my days as a student. My initial impression of the school was positive and it has remained that way throughout my time here. Our school has a tremendous staff and student body. Our parent community and PAC have been a pleasure to work with. If I had to choose a single word to describe my experience at NDSS it would be change.

When I first arrived NDSS was a school of 1000 students and today we have 1450. We went through an amalgamation with District Learning Alternatives that brought a large number of new staff, students and renovations to the site. We then said goodbye to Learning Alternatives and said hello to the many students and staff that came here from Woodlands Secondary. The culture of NDSS was positively impacted by the inclusion of the Woodlands culture and we did our best to make everyone feel welcome, although it was clear that many of the Woodlands community were grieving the loss of their school.

Other changes involved the agreement with the City of Nanaimo that brought us a glorious sports field that we are so proud of, and the addition of the Harewood Gym as a first rate fitness studio. I will always be an advocate for this school, and hope one day soon to see the current building get replaced with a modern structure built for the needs of our era.

After the Woodlands amalgamation, we were able to update our School Vision and Mission, which I am tremendously proud of: learning with purpose, striving for excellence and growing through community. If we all lived these every day, I think we would be alright. This school is an incredible incubator for administrators and I have had the benefit of mentoring, learning and working with incredible administrators, teachers and support staff.

Education is truly a collaborative effort and we all positively influence each other every day. Of course the students are the reason all of us do the things that we do. Our prime purpose is to educate students and get them to the point where they can walk the stage with dignity, purpose and options. I have been lucky to have been a part of seven grad classes crossing the stage at NDSS and now I look forward to my new adventure at Dover Bay Secondary.

There will be Numeracy and Literacy Assessments in November, January, and April this year. (This is a major change from our typical January and June Assessments.)


Double Blocks - We will likely be running a double block schedule for two days in November (5th and 6th), April (14th, 15th and 16th) and potentially in January for one or two days.



YCAN (YOUTH CLIMATE ACTION NETWORK) MEETS AT NDSS

Did you know that over the period 1948 to 2013, the average annual temperature in Canada has warmed by 1.6 °C (relative to the 1961-1990 average), a higher rate of warming than in most other regions of the world?

Our environment students have heard the news and are keen to do something about it! On October 23, 2019 student leaders from all seven district schools came together to discuss solutions to the climate crisis. Together with teachers, district support staff and city council members, district students have come together to create YCAN (Youth Climate Action Network).

YCAN's goals for direct action in 2019 include:

- 1) District Schools going Zero-Waste
- 2) 2) Nanaimo/Ladysmith becoming a "Bee-District"
- 3) 3) Improved access to Public transportation within and between cities
- 4) 4) increasing student awareness and community awareness of environmental issues and climate change

Our first YCAN meeting was buzzing with talk of what schools in SD68 are currently doing to combat climate change such as: promoting active transportation, the Energy Cup, school gardens, and recycling and composting programs. 





This Cashier Training course provides participants with basic training on cash register functions so that they feel comfortable and confident when entering the retail industry. On completion, participants are prepared to enter the work force with the knowledge and skills of what a cashier position entails.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS:
